DuckDuckGo

DuckDuckGo is a search engine that prides itself on keeping user information private. The search browser allows internet users to search the web without their searches being tracked. Ecosia

Searx

If you're savvy enough, Searx offers people the opportunity to use their code to run the search engine yourself.
